### Understand Fabric & Thread Qualities

- Store hemp silk threads in a breathable fabric pouch, away from direct sunlight and moisture.

#### Best Project Types

- Lightweight apparel such as summer dresses, tunics, scarves, or airy blouses.
- Home textiles including pillowcases, lightweight curtains, and napkins that benefit from soft drape.
- Decorative embroidery or detailed hand stitching where sheen and precision are emphasized.
- Special occasion garments where sustainability meets luxury aesthetics.

#### **Ethical & Sustainability Considerations**

- Support fair labor practices by sourcing from verified suppliers with transparent supply chains.
- Prefer threads from mills that use renewable energy or water-efficient production methods.
- Use recycled or upcycled hemp-silk blends to reduce environmental impact.
- Opt for plant-based, low-impact dyes, and avoid heavy metal-based finishes.
- Consider full lifecycle sustainability: from cultivation to disposal or recycling of fabric remnants.

## Practice & Color Matching

- Test small swatches before starting full projects to ensure smooth performance.
- Match thread shades against your chosen fabric in natural daylight to avoid mismatched tones.
- Experiment with tonal gradients or blending silk's natural sheen with matte fabrics.
- Use leftover thread ends to create sampler stitches for practicing tension and color harmony.
- Maintain a stitch journal or swatch book to track progress and reference techniques.
